


Critique not criticism

Changing mindset, changing language

We said	We now say	Because
Well done!	I can really see your effort in this next draft.	Praising effort and the learning process encourages writers to keep trying.
You're a good writer.	Those drafts really paid off in sentence variety and impact.	Encourages children to feel in charge of their progress.
You don't know how to use semi-colons properly.	You haven't mastered semicolons yet .	The power of yet suggests development and growth.
Try again.	Additional adverbials and clearer links between paragraphs would improve the effectiveness of your writing.	Specific feedback gives writers purpose when redrafting.
Write a persuasive essay.	Write a letter to Mrs Butler persuading her to ban homework.	Writers need a real purpose and real motivation to do their best work.

Finally...

Celebrating a final 'published' piece of writing is a great way to exemplify growth mindset in action.

Children look at their final piece and compare it to their plan or first draft. (Remember Austin's Butterfly?)


Children see the evidence that growth mindset is real.
