My background is that I'm a former scientist, having worked for eleven years in natural rubber research running an electron microscopy laboratory before answering the call to ordained ministry. I trained for three years at Ridley Hall in Cambridge, getting an MA in Pastoral Theology and then did four years as a curate at St. Andrew's in Bedford before moving to my post of Tanworth in Arden, a rural outpost of Birmingham diocese.

Clergy tend to have an unusual mixture of interests across their parish, theological and personal lives, so in the parish I have loved being creative with how we worship by developing new services that attract different groups of people while maintaining a strong focus on preaching, teaching, writing and leading or participating in small groups.
