1. I would tell a parent and get them to block it and delete the message. Tell a teacher. Once I've got the teacher, get them to delete and block it and report.
2. No you shouldn't reply because they might get your personal information. If you press the link they might find out where the school is. There might also be something you wouldn't want to see on there if you press the link. It could give you a virus. If you do reply, you might go on to a website that you can't get out of and it might cause trouble.
3. Any trusted adults like the ones on your hand. Safeguarding teams, Miss Jones, Mrs Dennis, Mrs Robinson, Miss Sims

1. We would tell a trusted adult, like a teacher. Tell someone who has a blue or yellow lanyard.
2. I wouldn't go into the message or click on the link. I wouldn't reply to the message because you should never trust strangers.
3. Tell the teacher straight away for help.



Firecrests

1. Tell a teacher. Tell a trusted adult. Ignore the message. Tell one of the safeguarding team e.g. Miss Sims, Mrs Robinson, Miss Jones or Mrs Dennis. Whatever you do, do not listen to the message and don't do what they say.
2. You should not reply, ever. Do not reply because you don't know who the person is. Because they could pretend to be a child, and they might be an adult. They might try to hack you or want your details, and you shouldn't give your details to them.
3. Talk to safeguarding leads and teachers/teacher in the classroom etc.

Safeguarding Pupils at St Paul's

Safeguarding - You are using a school tablet when a message pops up from someone you don't know. They are asking you to click on a link or tell them your name. You feel a little worried and unsure about what to do.

- ◆ What would you do?
- ◆ Should you reply? Why or why not?
- ◆ Who could you talk to for help?

Sparrows

1. I would tell a teacher straight away.
2. You should not reply because you don't know who they are or what they would do with the information.
3. You could talk to the teacher or safeguarding team or one of your 5 trusted adults.

Swifts

1. Tell a grown up
2. We wouldn't reply.
3. Any adult at school or anyone wearing a yellow, blue or green lanyard.
