



### Owls

1. Ignore him and walk off as he could be tricking you
  1. Say no and walk away
  1. Go back to your house and tell an adult about it
  2. It's easy to lie and if you don't know them you wouldn't know if they are lying
  2. Your parents should have told you if someone different was taking you to school
  3. His parents, teachers, police, an adult who works nearby - eg, if they were close to a shop they could go in to the shop and speak to staff
  4. Tell a teacher immediately
  5. Bring your phone and hand it in to the office. Ask parents who is taking you to/from school
- Go with a friend

### Robins

1. Don't go with him. Walk away. Don't listen. Don't respond to him.
2. It is a stranger. They might be lying. They might kidnap you.
3. He can tell his Mum. The police. Teachers at school.
4. Tell a teacher.
5. Walk with my parents. Stay close to your grownup.

### Finches

1. Liam should say NO, scream loudly, run away.
2. They might be telling untruths.
3. One of his 5 trusted adults.
4. Tell the teacher or one of his 5 trusted adults.
5. Always go with a parent or trusted adult. Never speak to strangers.

### Safeguarding Pupils at St Paul's

Eight-year-old Liam usually walks to school with his older sister. One morning, his sister is unwell, so Liam walks alone. On his way, a friendly-looking adult he doesn't know stops him and says:

"Hi there! I know your mum. She asked me to give you a lift to school today. Hop in!"

1. What should Liam do?
2. Why is it important not to go with someone you don't know, even if they say they know your parents?
3. Who can Liam ask for help if he feels unsafe?
4. What should Liam do when he gets to school?
5. How can we make sure we always stay safe on our way to and from school?

### Swifts

1. We don't speak to strangers and we would walk the opposite way if a car came near us
2. We can ask our family to help us or a trusted adults
3. We need to stay with our adults and listen to instructions
4. Liam needs to talk to his teacher
5. We need to speak to our families about how they can keep us safe

### Sparrows

1. Don't talk to them. Don't get in the car. Ignore them. Run away. Scream for help.
2. They might kidnap, They might be unkind. They could take you away.
3. Ask for help from parents of a child they know. Ask for help from other adults with children. Ask for help from someone like a policeman. Go into a shop and ask for help.
4. Tell a teacher or other adult straight away. Tell a safeguarding lead.
5. Try not to be on your own, go with a friend, go with someone you know, stay close to a group of people, Go straight home.

### Firecrests

1. Say no because he doesn't know him, and he could get kidnapped.
2. Shout for help or shout for mum so people know you are a child who is looking for their mum so they will come and help.  
Run away.
3. They could be lying to you, and you have never met them before. Your parents would have told you if someone was going to take you to school or pick you up. He could go into a shop and ask for help in there. He could ask other people around him for help, maybe a family with children.
4. He should tell a teacher what happened straight away
5. Don't talk to strangers, each morning ask who is picking you up at the end of the day so you know. If you have a phone, keep your phone on you when you are walking to and from school.



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
